	Ask about test dates for the PSAT, ACT and SAT. Plan to take PSAT in October and SAT/ACT in the spring. Review information about PSAT/NMSQT with your counselor.
	Start developing a resume – a record of your accomplishments, activities and work experience. This will be an important part of your college application.
	If you haven't participated in activities outside of class, now is the time to sign up. Consider clubs at school, team sports, leadership roles, part-time employment or involvement in a religious or civic community group.
	Attend the NEACAC College Fair at St. Michael's College on 9/18 (6:30 – 8:30 PM) and 9/19 (9 – 11 AM).
	Look at College Visit Information in the counseling office to meet with visiting college reps.
	Begin work on your portfolio in Advisory and continue refining your personalized learning plan.

	Take the PSAT. Taking the test as a junior will qualify you for some scholarship consideration and identify you to colleges as a potential applicant.
	Continue working on your resume.
	Attend the VSAC Financial Aid Form Workshop.
	Continue working on your portfolio in Advisory.

	Consider career goals. Meet with our Gear Up Coordinator to explore career options.
	Begin to prepare for the SAT or ACT. Plan to take one of these tests in spring. Ask your counselor if you qualify for a fee waiver.

	Keep editing your resume. Colleges look closely at your junior year. Review PSAT scores with your school counselor. Students will receive their test booklets so that they can review questions which they answered incorrectly. Use this test to help study for the SAT. Become familiar with Khan Academy and their SAT study tools. Make an appointment with your school counselor to discuss the college application process, Letters of Recommendation, and the Common App during December or January. Your counselor will help you research colleges or other options for post-high school (these meetings will continue throughout the year.) If you are working with an independent private college counselor, you still need to meet with your Cabot school counselor.
